Honorary Degree

REV. G. S. MACK McCarter, III Doctor of Humane Letters

Mack McCarter founded Community Renewal International (CRI) in Shreveport in 1994, with a mission to reconstruct both the foundation and the actual infrastructure of society through developing a system of loving relationships. Based on his training and experience as an ordained minister in the Disciples of Christ denomination, McCarter's vision for CRI invites community members to, "partner together with God and one another to make our world a home where every single child, no matter their age, can be safe and loved." McCarter has received many awards as CRI's representative, including Social Entrepreneur of the Year from The Manhattan Institute, Louisiana Public Citizen of the Year from the National Association of Social Workers, Distinguished Alumnus of the Year from Texas Christian University, Distinguished Minister of the Year from Brite Divinity School, National Citizen of the Year from the National Conference on Citizenship, and Doctor of Letters Degree (Honorary) conferred by Nyack College/Alliance Theological Seminary. McCarter also received the 2019-2020 Lumen Christi Award from the Catholic Extension.

Academic Bress

Principal features of academic dress are the gown, the cap, and the hood. Early, it became necessary for universities to set rules and standards to preserve the dignity and meaning of the academic attire. In 1895, the American Intercollegiate Commission adopted a uniform academic costume code, which is reflected in most of the regalia worn today. Meanwhile, European universities maintained their right to variety. The vivid diversity of regalia for European degree holders brings to the American commencement such visual pleasures as sable berets, cardinal robes, and other distinctive garb.

THE ROBE OR GOWN: Originally worn as protection against the cold of unheated buildings, the gowns used in American academic ceremonies today vary according to the highest degree awarded to the wearer. Bachelor's gowns have pointed sleeves, and are worn closed. Master's gowns have oblong sleeves, open at the wrist, with the base hanging down, and rear part of the oblong cut square while the front arc cuts away. These robes have fasteners so they can be worn open or closed. The doctoral gown is a more elaborate costume faced down the front with velvet and across the sleeves with three bars of the same; these facings and crossbars may be of velvet of the color distinctive to the field of study to which the degree pertains. The doctoral gown has bell-shaped sleeves and may be worn open or closed. All three gowns are often black, but many colleges and universities use school colors for their academic regalia, especially doctoral robes.

THE CAP: The mortarboard cap is standard, although soft square-topped caps and tams are also utilized. A long tassel is fastened to the middle point of the top of the cap. The tassel should be black or the color appropriate to the academic discipline, with the exception of the doctor's cap that may have a gold tassel.

THE HOOD: The hoods are lined in silk with the official color or colors of the institution which granted the highest degree held by the wearer; more than one color is shown by division of the field color in a variety of ways, such as by chevron or chevrons. The binding or edging of the hood is in velvet, with widths of two inches, three inches, and five inches for the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees respectively; the color of the border indicates the field of study to which the degree pertains.
